The **outback** is the remote areas of Australia. The outback is not a defined area, it is only a term used to refer to locations that are far away from big cities.







- The UK flag represent the country's history as part of the British Empire, and that New Zealand is currently part of the Commonwealth of Nations. The blue background represents the sky and sea that surrounds New Zealand.

- This is the Southern cross, Symbolising New Zealand's place in the South Pacific Ocean. The stars are red and white to mirror the design of the UK flag. The use of red may have also been chosen to represent the Maori people of New Zealand.
