
St Peter's School Renovation Project




We are due to move to another school building (Riverbank School) whilst works are carried out on the existing school site to upgrade and extend.

The law on all forms of physical punishment of children in Scotland has changed. On 7 November 2020, all forms of physical punishment of children became against the law in Scotland.

This contains information about why this law has been introduced and what it does.

Our website also includes details about what we've done to prepare for this change in the law and where support is available for those that want it.

This change in the law is about making things better for children in Scotland.

Physical punishment is not in the best interests of children, and it can be harmful. It includes but is not limited to smacking, slapping, skelping and pinching.

We want Scotland to be the best place in the world for children to grow up, and this legal change supports that aim.





We know it can sometimes be difficult to cope with being a parent or carer.

That's why we've put together some advice and tips for keeping calm when things get challenging.

First Week

Pupils should be here by 9.00am.

Pupils will be met by the teachers in the playground (near the office).

Please collect your child at 12.30pm on Tuesday and 1.45pm on Wednesday.

P1s will begin full time with us from the Thursday.

Please wait at the pick up point (Dunbar Street). Teachers will bring the children out to the pick-up point.



Week 2 onwards

P1 children will follow the same routines as the rest of the school. Playground opens at 8.50am. Children should be in their line by 9.00am. Any children arriving late (after 9.00am when classes have gone in) should be brought to the office by a parent / carer.

Transport for those pupils receiving this will start this week. Arrangements will be shared for bus stop pick up and drop off times from school transport team.

Please support the safety of our whole school community and neighbours by parking legally and responsibly. There is **no parking** for parents / carers on school premises. This helps to keep our children safe.

Attendance



Parents are asked to ensure that children attend school regularly and punctually.

Children who arrive late for school miss vital morning routines and may find it hard to understand the planned learning activities for the day. Please let us know if your child is absent by telephoning 01224 485611 or e-mailing stpeters@aberdeencity.gov.uk by 9.15am on the first day of absence.

Groupcall texts are sent to families if we have not been notified and we work closely with our Home-School Liaison Officer who calls at the homes of children whose attendance gives cause for concern.

Please try to arrange appointments out with the school day. <u>Family</u> holidays should not be taken during term time and will be recorded as unauthorised absences unless there are very exceptional <u>circumstances.</u>



On-time collection of pupils

Parents / carers (or those registered to collect pupils) should be at school before 3.15pm to collect their child at the end of the school day. Parents are also asked to be at the transport stops ahead of the scheduled arrival of the bus for pupils who are transported.

Communication and Online Systems

We use Google Classroom to share learning (including photos / updates) and assign home learning.

We send home paper slips to inform you if your child has had a small accident / injury in school.

The school use "Groupcall" to send texts / emails to parents with useful and important information.



We will share log-in details at the start of P1 for Google classroom and other home learning systems.

School Uniform





Navy sweatshirt or cardigan (can be with school badge or plain)



Remember to write your child's name or put a name label on every jacket, sweatshirt and polo shirt.





Pale blue polo shirt (can be with the school logo) Plain pale blue polo shirts can be bought in supermarkets and department stores

Dark trousers (grey, black or dark blue) Grey, black or dark blue skirts or pinafores. In summer, blue gingham dresses can be worn.

Remember to write your child's name or put a name label on every jacket, sweatshirt, polo shirt, shorts, bag and lunchbox. Please write your child's name inside the indoor shoes too.

A school bag

Remember to write your child's name or put a name label on the schoolbag.



Gym shoes / indoor shoes to wear in the classroom and gym hall Please write your child's name inside the indoor shoes too.

A piece of fruit for break time and a packed lunch box if desired (e.g. for days your child will not be taking a school lunch) Please write your child's name inside the packed lunch box.


Food in school

Children may bring one piece of fruit for snack.

Please do not send in extra food. We are not allowed to give out sweets or birthday cake.

No nuts in packed lunch boxes / in school. We have some children and staff with severe nut allergies.

Please inform school of any allergies (food or other) your child has.



School lunch

Healthy lunches are provided from Seaton kitchen. Children can choose from at least three options every day.



The menu is available via the <u>Aberdeen City Council website</u> (search "Aberdeen City Schools Meals".

It is important your child knows what they would like to order for lunch each day. You will receive information for Parent Pay to support with ordering meals at home.

School meals are free for children in P1 – P5, and parents of older children can apply for free school meals at any time. Those meeting the criteria can also apply at any time (P1 August onwards) to have access to benefits such as school clothing grant.



How do I apply?

If you want to apply for our benefits in a language that's not. English call us on 0800 182 2222 and ask for an interpreter.

We can arrange an interpreter in over 100 languages and they will help you fill in the application over the phone.

It's free for you to apply in a language that's not English. The online and paper application forms are only in English.

Dignity, fairness, respect.



A guide to Social Security Scotland's benefits

Social Security Scotland was set up by the Scottish Government to deliver a social security system for the people of Scotland based on the values of dignity, fairness and respect.

We deliver benefits for people with children under 16, disabled people, carers, young people entering the workplace, people who need help paying for a funeral and to help people heat their homes.

The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) and local authorities also continue to deliver some benefits.

For people with children under 16

People getting Universal Credit, tax credits or other qualifying benefits could be entitled to five family payments.

Best Start Grant Pregnancy and Baby Payment

A £754.65 payment for a first child and £377.35 for other children. People can apply from the end of the 24th week of pregnancy until their baby is 6 months old.

Best Start Grant Early Learning Payment

A £314.45 payment when a child is between the ages of 2 and 3.5 years. People can still get the payment if their child is not taking up a place at nursery.

Best Start Grant School Age Payment

A £314.45 payment when a child is first old enough to start school. You don't need to take up a school place to get the payment.

Best Start Foods

Money every four weeks on a pre-paid card from pregnancy until a child is 3 years old to buy healthy food.

Scottish Child Payment

A payment of £106.80 every 4 weeks for each of your children under the age of 16.

For young people entering the workplace

Job Start Payment

£314.45 to help people aged 16-24 with the costs of starting a new job. Available to those who have been getting certain benefits for 6 months or more and returning to work after being unemployed. People with children will receive £503.10.

For people who need help paying for a funeral

Funeral Support Payment

A one off payment to help cover some of the costs of a funeral. For people getting Universal Credit, tax credits or other qualifying benefits.

To help people heat their homes

Child Winter Heating Payment

£251.50 paid once a year help disabled children, young people and their families getting certain qualifying benefits with increased heating costs over winter.

Winter Heating Payment

A yearly payment of £58.75 that's paid automatically to help people getting certain benefits who might have extra heating needs.

For carers

Carer's Allowance Supplement

An extra payment of £288.60 to people who are getting Carer's Allowance from the DWP or Carer Support Payment from Social Security Scotland on certain qualifying dates. This is paid automatically every 6 months.

Young Carer Grant

A payment of £383.75 once a year for 16, 17 and 18 year olds who care for someone getting a disability benefit for around 16 hours a week.

For disabled people Child Disability Payment

A payment every 4 weeks to help with the extra costs of caring for a child with a disability, illness or health condition.

Adult Disability Payment

Financial support for people if they are aged between 16 and state pension age, and are disabled, have a long term health condition or terminal illness.




Google Classroom
