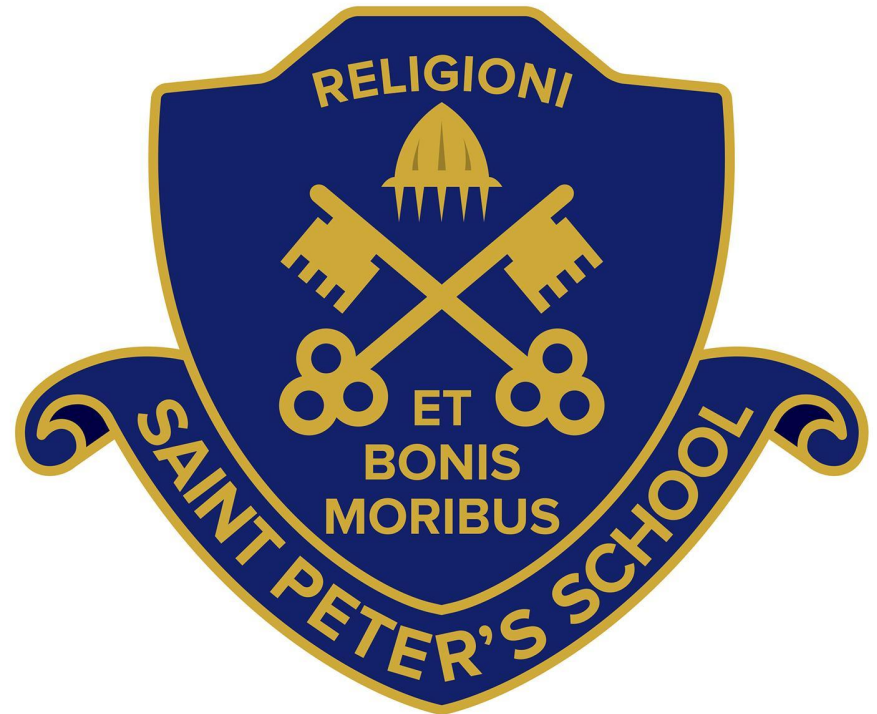

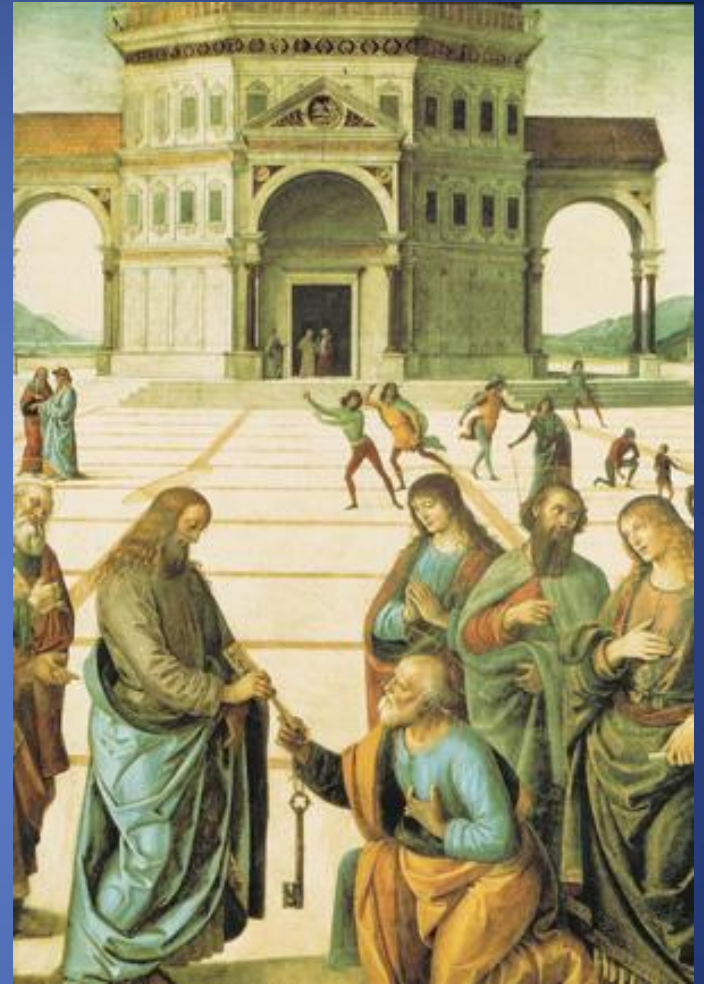
St Peter's School Renovation Project

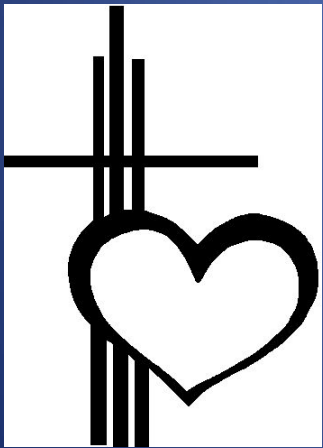

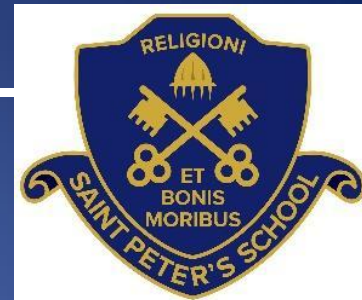

The law on all forms of physical punishment of children in Scotland has changed.
On 7 November 2020, all forms of physical punishment of children
became against the law in Scotland.

This change in the law is about making things better for children in Scotland.

Physical punishment is not in the best interests of children, and it can be harmful. It includes but is not limited to smacking, slapping, skelping and pinching.

We want Scotland to be the best place in the world for children to grow up, and this legal change supports that aim.



We know it can sometimes be difficult to cope with being a parent or carer.

That's why we've put together some advice and tips for keeping calm when things get challenging.

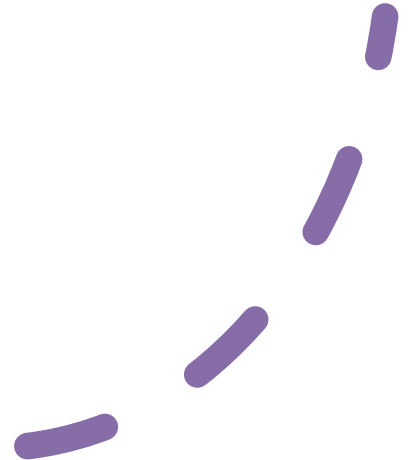
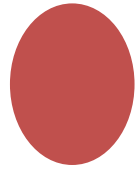

Attendance



Parents are asked to ensure that children attend school regularly and punctually.

Children who arrive late for school miss vital morning routines and may find it hard to understand the planned learning activities for the day. Please let us know if your child is absent by telephoning the school or emailing stpeters@aberdeencity.gov.uk by 9.15am on the first day of absence.

Groupcall texts are sent to families if we have not been notified and we work closely with our Home-School Liaison Officer who calls at the homes of children whose attendance gives cause for concern.

Please try to arrange appointments out with the school day. **Family holidays should not be taken during term time and will be recorded as unauthorised absences unless there are very exceptional circumstances.**

Please note that the August 2025 dates within there are not applicable to our school. Pupils will start on Thursday 21st August at Dill Road to allow us to set up the site.



On-time collection of pupils

Parents / carers (or those registered to collect pupils) should be at school before 3.15pm to collect their child at the end of the school day. Parents are also asked to be at the transport stops ahead of the scheduled arrival of the bus for pupils who are transported.

What does my child need to bring?



A school bag

Remember to write your child's name or put a name label on the schoolbag.



Gym shoes / indoor shoes to wear in the classroom and gym hall

Please write your child's name inside the indoor shoes too.

What does my child need to bring?



A water bottle

Remember to write your child's name or put a name label on the bottle. Flip lid / leak-proof are best.

A piece of fruit for break time and a packed lunch box if desired (e.g. for days your child will not be taking a school lunch)

Please write your child's name inside the packed lunch box.



Food in school

Children may bring one piece of fruit for snack.

Please do not send in extra food.

We are not allowed to give out sweets or birthday cake.

No nuts in packed lunch boxes / in school. We have some children and staff with severe nut allergies.

Please inform school of any allergies (food or other) your child has.



School lunch

Healthy lunches are provided from Seaton kitchen. Children can choose from at least three options every day.



The menu is available via the [Aberdeen City Council website](#) (search “Aberdeen City Schools Meals”).

It is important your child knows what they would like to order for lunch each day. You will receive information for Parent Pay to support with ordering meals at home.

School meals are free for children in P1 – P5, and parents of older children can apply for free school meals at any time. Those meeting the criteria can also apply at any time (P1 August onwards) to have access to benefits such as school clothing grant.



Other benefits you may be entitled to

Benefit	Payment	Eligibility
Scottish Child Payment A payment per child to help towards the costs of supporting a family.	£108.60 every 4 weeks.	Children until their 16th birthday.
Best Start Grant Pregnancy and Baby Payment A payment to help towards the costs of pregnancy or looking after a baby.	£767.50 payment for a first child and £383.75* for subsequent children.	Apply from the end of the 24 th week of pregnancy until the baby is 6 months old.
Best Start Grant Early Learning Payment A payment per child to help with the costs of early learning.	One-off £319.80 payment.	Apply when a child is between the ages of 2 and 3.5 years. People can still apply if their child is not taking up a place at nursery.
Best Start Grant School Age Payment A payment per child to help with the costs of preparing for school.	One-off £319.80 payment.	Apply in the year a child is first old enough to start school. People can still apply and get the payment if a child is deferring starting school.
Best Start Foods Money on a pre-paid chip and pin card to buy healthy food including eggs, milk, fruit, vegetables and pulses.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • £21.60 every 4 weeks during pregnancy • £43.20 every 4 weeks from birth until the child's first birthday • £21.60 every 4 weeks for any child from 1 until they turn 3. 	Apply from pregnancy until a child turns 3.

INTERDISCIPLINARY LEARNING (IDL)

- We plan whole school contexts for learning.
- We make use of partners and the local (and wider) area to support our learning across the school. Trips and outings are a big part of our learning here.
- We always aim to message parents to let you know that your child will be leaving school premises.



How can **you** get your child ready?

Reassure him/ her that he / she is ready for school.

Teach him/ her

- How to put on and take off shoes.
- How to put on and fasten a jacket, take it off and hang it up.
- How to use the toilet and wash hands afterwards.
- How to use a knife, fork and spoon.
- How to clear away at the end of a meal.
- How to put things back where they belong!



How can **you** get your child ready?

Show him/ her

- How to take turns
- How to sit nicely and listen without interrupting
- How to get along with other children
- How to treat adults
- How to 'have a go' and never be afraid of making a mistake



How can **you** get your child ready?

Let him/her know

- Adults are here to help. We need to know how to help so tell us if you are sad, confused, lonely, sick.....
- We say “Please”, “Thank you” and “Sorry”
- We treat everyone with respect all the time.
